There are many books on occultism that are of some vague relevance to ritual witchcraft, but not much, and listing them would take much longer than they are worth. · . Categories:

- 1 Works directly and mainly about ritual witchcraft.
- 2 Works indirectly or partly about ritual witchcraft.
- 3 Works not about ritual witchcraft, but of some realizable or apparent relevance to it.

Ranks:

- AA Works of genius; classics.
- A First-rate works, well-written, in which facts are used intelligently, and which contains almost no bullshit.
- B Second-rate works, competently written, but based on some untenable assumptions, and so containing a noticeable amount of bullshit (about 10 to 25%).
- C Mediocre works, not very well-written, by an author not bright enough to use facts intelligently, and so containing much bullshit (about 50%)
- D Poor works, badly written, and thoroughly unreliable, by an author who, though, not purposely dishonest, is not bright enough to avoid some dishonest assumptions; these works contain about 75% bullshit.
- F Useless works, badly written, containing no reliable information and about 90% bullshit, by a stupid and ignorant author who is, nevertheless, apparently not intentionally dishonest.
- FF Totally worthless works, containing 100% bullshit, by a dishonest and avaricious authors who wrote it merely \$2 to make a fast buck.
